#### **Come See Our New Bridge!**

Village officials and the many volunteers who take care of our parks invite you to take a walk on the new Hika Park Pedestrian Bridge. The bridge is the latest improvement (out of many) to Hika Park made possible by a unique collaboration between the Village of Cleveland, Friends of Hika Bay, and the Lakeshore Natural Resource Partnership. These entities - with help from private and public grants, assistance from local and regional businesses, and a whole lot of elbow grease from volunteers - have been enhancing Hika Park's environmental and recreational assets since 2009.

We're especially excited about the pedestrian bridge, an instantly recognizable, and immediately useful accomplishment for this beautiful lakeshore park. The new bridge connects two areas of the park - the boat landing area and the Hika shores natural area - and enlarges park accessibility from 2 to nearly 14 acres.

Local support for the project came from Cleveland State Bank, with additional grant dollars coming from the Wisconsin Coastal Management Program and the West Foundation of Manitowoc. Construction and installation was completed by McMullen and Pitz of Manitowoc.

One of the project goals was to increase recreational opportunities for village residents and visitors to the park. The bridge will allow visitors to enjoy both the southern and northern areas of the lakeshore park without having to walk on Hwy LS.

Once the weather gets better, please visit the park and take a walk across the bridge! You will find available parking on the south end of the park.



# **UTILITY RATES** PART 2

Last newsletter, we reviewed changes in water and sewer utility rates. This article follows with a discussion on deferred maintenance and sewer rates.

**Treatment plant debt.** Construction of the wastewater treatment plant in 1996 required the Village to assume over \$3.45 million of debt to be repaid over 20 years. Unlike a personal loan, the payments for municipal debt get larger over time. The higher payments are to be covered by the growth in the number of customers. Without growth, rates must be increased for existing customers to make these higher payments.

Cleveland's estimated population in 1996 was 1473 persons. In 2017, the estimate was 1512 persons. In 20 years, that's an increase of 39 people or 2.6% of the population. That's not much growth to absorb the increasing costs for debt and operations. It left Village boards with difficult choices as far as savings and investments for both utilities.

**Deferred maintenance.** Village boards recognized and responded to the financial concerns of our small customer base. To keep rate increases as low as possible, decisions were made to save minimally and defer many maintenance and improvement projects until the debt was paid. When that time came in 2015, the Village Board commissioned a study to determine the condition of the sewer utility's infrastructure, and identify and prioritize needed projects.

The good news was the study found no emergency actions were required. It did identify almost \$2.0 million of investments to be completed over the next 10 years, excluding phosphorus compliance. Work began immediately to implement the urgent projects, and the Village Board began saving for the 5- to 10 year projects. While the Board would have preferred to dramatically drop rates, the members could not in good conscience take this step knowing the work which remained to be done.

These decisions are made with careful consideration and research, with the focus always on the safety and well-being of our customers. Please contact any Board member or me at Village Hall if you have questions or comments on this topic.
