The Cleveland Police Department is sharing a few reminders to ensure that all our residents have a safe summer ☺

We participated in the "Click It or Ticket Campaign – May 23 to June 5." Don't become a statistic, please be safe and buckle up.

With the warm temperatures, it's time to think Summer, Fun, and Safety! Here are a couple of reminders that can keep family members, children, pets, veterans, and the elderly safe.

Don't leave anyone in the car.

Even if you don't think it's that hot out, leaving somebody in a car — especially a child — can be dangerous. Extreme heat may cause heat exhaustion, which can then develop into heatstroke and lead to organ damage or death, if left untreated.

You should never leave your children, pets, or elderly relatives in a car, no matter the circumstances. Cracking windows, short periods of time, relatively mild days, leaving water, or running the air conditioner does not make a parked car a safe place for a child or pet to be alone.

Cars parked in the **shade** on a hot day had lower — but still scorching — temperatures. After 1 hour, the interior temperature of these cars reached an average of 100 degrees F. The dashboards of these cars averaged 118 degrees F; the steering wheel averaged 107 degrees F; and the seats averaged 105 degrees F, the researchers found.

Please remember to lock your vehicles whenever they are parked outside, in your driveway, or on the street. It is a huge deterrent to people who are looking to steal your hard-earned property out of your vehicle. Never leave guns or any item of value in your car. Almost all vehicle break-ins, theft from vehicles, and stolen vehicles had the keys left inside or the doors unlocked.

4th of July celebrations can be a great time to get together with family, friends, and neighbors, please be respectful with your celebrations. Fireworks that leave the ground are illegal and extremely stressful for our residents, veterans, and family pets. LNRP and the Friends of Hika Bay Resume Water Quality Monitoring with UWGB Interns

LNRP will once again analyze water quality on several rivers and streams in Manitowoc County in collaboration with UWGB-Manitowoc Campus Lakeshore Water Institute. This annual, in-depth study of water quality began in 2012 and with only a pause in 2020 due to Covid-19 has analyzed and presented the work of interns that we call the “stream team” with a focus on Centerville Creek along with Fischer, Point, Pine, and Calvin Creeks.

In 2022, we will focus on three primary project sites: the restoration sites at Centerville Creek and the Little Manitowoc River, and the Pine Creek 9 Key Element Plan that also includes Calvin Creek. Analysis includes e-coli, phosphorus, nitrogen, and six additional water quality parameters.

The interns will present their summer findings at a UWGB-Manitowoc Campus event on October 12, 2022. Everyone is invited! Please watch for details on the Friends of Hika Bay website: friendsofhikabay.org.

Lakeshore Technical College

New General Studies Transfer Programs Launching at Lakeshore Technical College in Fall

Approval for Lakeshore Technical College to begin offering two new degrees was granted at the April meeting of the University of Wisconsin Board of Regents. Launching this fall will be Associate of Arts and Associate of Science degrees. Both degrees cover general education requirements for a student whose goal is to transfer to a four-year college to earn a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree.

Once final approval is secured from the college's regional accreditor, students enrolling in the AA and AS degrees will be able to access federal financial aid and veteran's benefits while taking their general education courses at Lakeshore.

In addition, through a new partnership with the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, students graduating with the AA or AS degree will have guaranteed junior standing when they enroll at UW-Green Bay. The AA and AS degrees also join the long list of existing agreements between Lakeshore and Lakeland University for students completing their associate degrees to transfer to LU.

The general studies degree programs require 60 credits including elective courses that allow students to select courses that appeal to their future career plans.

According to Lakeshore President Dr. Paul Carlsen, the new degrees and partnerships with UW-Green Bay and LU are game changers for students, who can save thousands of dollars on their way to a bachelor's degree. He says more than 100 students already transfer each year from Lakeshore to four-year colleges across the country, and he expects that number to increase.

Students start on their path to a bachelor's degree at Lakeshore because of the college's affordability, low faculty-to-student ratio, fewer distractions, and location close to students' homes.

Registration is open for summer and fall courses. Summer term starts June 6. Fall term starts August 22.

Summer hours at the Lakeshore Technical College Fitness Center will be Monday through Thursday 6 am - 10 pm, Friday 6 am - 4 pm, and Saturday and Sunday 6 am - 11 am. The Fitness Center will be closed Fridays starting July 1 through August 5, when the campus is closed as part of the college's energy conservation initiative. Open times may also change based on classes running.

All Cleveland village residents 18 years or older may use the college's Fitness Center at no charge. The unsupervised facility is equipped with treadmills, elliptical machines, a stair machine, exercise bikes, jump ropes, exercise balls, mats, free weights, and numerous weight machines.
